Failure and Faith

As we move toward the penitential season of Lent, the readings for today focus on our failings. Yet, we are consoled by the fact that something 'new' is happening in our midst.

Just as the prophet Isaiah gave hope to the Israelites, we need hope in our day. Paul reminds us that hope in God is never in vain because God will always bestow mercy upon us.

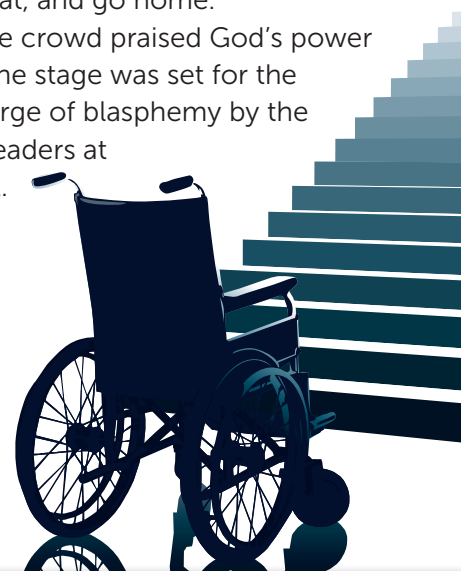
As the Gospel story of the paralytic and his four friends floats through my mind, I cannot help but think of the verse to a song that says, "He ain't heavy, he's my brother."

The crowd made it impossible for the friends to get inside the door of the home to meet Jesus face-to-face. But all five men must have heard about Jesus and already they had faith in his power to heal. With ingenuity and perseverance, they created an opening in the thatched roof to lower their paralyzed friend into the very room where Jesus stood teaching.

Jesus, admiring their faith, first pronounced that the man was forgiven of all his sins. Some of the scribes looked on with astonishment and disbelief. They accused Jesus of blasphemy, "Who can forgive sins but God alone?"

To prove his authority as the Son of Man, Jesus healed the man of his paralysis and instructed him to get up, take his mat, and go home.

While the crowd praised God's power in Jesus, the stage was set for the future charge of blasphemy by the religious leaders at Jesus' trial.



The Faith of the Church

When the human heart is burdened and heavy with guilt, God's desire is to give us a new heart through the grace of conversion. With the help of the Spirit, we are given the strength to seek and trust in God's merciful forgiveness so that we might have a fresh and new start in our relationship with him (Cf. *Catechism of the Catholic Church* 1432).



Questions of the Week

Jesus' pronouncement of forgiveness was startling to those present. The scribes believed that only God could forgive sin. Thus, the link between Jesus and God is established early in the Gospel of Mark.

Adults

Do I truly believe that God forgives my sins and imperfections?

Children

When have I made a big mistake and asked God to forgive me?

Responding to God's Word . . .

God not only forgives our sins, misdeeds, and imperfections, he uses them for good. The tale of the Chinese water bearer illustrates the depths of Divine mercy.

The wise water bearer carried two clay pots each day to get water from the stream. One pot had a crack in it, delivering only a half full pot of water. The other pot was perfect and always delivered a full pot of water.

After two years, the cracked pot perceived itself as a failure. But the water carrier pointed out to the pot that flowers blossomed on the side of the road. He had planted seeds when

he noticed the crack in the pot, and the water that trickled out caused them to grow and flourish. "Without your being the way you are, there would not be this beauty," explained the water bearer.

We all have unique cracks and flaws that make our lives interesting, cause our growth, and ground us in God's mercy. Instead of being paralyzed by our defects, we are set free knowing that spiritual growth most often occurs through our imperfections.

God works goodness out of our imperfections when we surrender and accept that we are all cracked pots.

SUGGESTIONS

Use one of these suggestions or one of your own to respond to God's Word this week.

In the home. Create a simple "Examination of Conscience" to be used frequently during the upcoming Lenten Season.

In the workplace or in school. Look around for a friend or coworker who is struggling and offer concrete help, listening and sharing your faith.

In the community. In your parish or neighborhood, write a note to reconcile with someone who you need to forgive.



Meditation Moment

Isiah Thomas of the Detroit Pistons was picked for the NBA All Star team 10 years in a row. In an interview with *You* magazine, he talked about his faith: "My mom's faith has definitely influenced mine. . . . Whenever I'm down . . . I remember that her favorite saying is 'You make one step and the Lord will make two. He'll work the wonder for you.' It always reminds me to get up . . . and move on."
